This, she said, was in addition to inkind contributions.

"The campaign was successful; and of course, for us at United Way, rehabilitation and restoration are areas, which we focus on in times of disaster," she said.

Several islands were affected by the hurricanes, which moved across the northern Caribbean leaving a trail of death and destruction.

Some of the countries to benefit from the contributions from Jamaica, include Turks and Caicos, Puerto Rico, Dominica and Haiti.
