

Since its inception in 1990, the JN Foundation, has charted a dynamic course of corporate social responsibility, with its "Act!on" programmes and projects. These projects have dramatically changed the performance of community-based and other organisations; as well as, promoting the development of— social enterprises, financial literacy, education, the arts, community development, road safety and youth advocacy.

I am proud of the achievements of the JN Foundation; and the ability of its management and team members. During the past year some 63 community projects and seven internal programmes, which have changed the lives of more than 45,000 beneficiaries in parishes across Jamaica and countless others overseas, were implemented.

The range and quality of the projects; as well as, their impact and reach are indeed tangible evidence that the JN Foundation continues to successfully "unleash the power of possibility..." as it contributes to "a skilled, educated workforce to support the sustainable growth and development of Jamaica."

Through its alliance with the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), to fund and implement a novel project, the Social Enterprise Boost Initiative (SEBI), the JN Foundation has facilitated improved business skills and technical capacity in 10 local enterprises. Already the leaders have demonstrated better management skills, increased sales and employed additional staff members.

At the same time, administrators, educators and students in five high schools in the parishes of St. Mary, Portland and St. Thomas, who are currently participating in the iLead Programme, are reaping the rewards from quality leadership skills and a better school culture.



In addition, more than 2,000 persons, young people and adults participated in some 33 seminars and workshops in financial literacy. The Member Advisory Councils (MACs), located in JN Branches across the island, continue to lend their support to numerous worthwhile projects, which enhanced the lives of many people in their respective communities.

In the same mode that JNBS has reached out beyond our national borders to serve its members in the Diaspora, the JN Foundation has also carried the messages of cultural heritage and national pride to emerging generations of Jamaicans overseas, via its Resolution Project; and, mobilised Jamaicans at home to volunteer, and gain skills though its "Act!on" projects.

The successful implementation of the wide range of activities outlined in this annual report, has in turn, facilitated The Jamaica National Group on-going commitment to rural re-generation; empowerment of young people through the arts; influenced entrepreneurship and stimulated growth.

I sincerely commend Miss Saffrey Brown, General Manager, for her ability to innovate, inspire and lead with act!on. Her guidance of a brilliant team of young people, positions the JN Foundation, as part of the solution, in the implementation of projects, which make a difference in the lives of many people. GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE

As the charitable-arm of The Jamaica National Group, JN Foundation is charged with developing and implementing projects that can help to address the needs of the Jamaican people.

At the end of 2017, **5,276** people were trained by the **BeWi\$e** Financial Empowerment team. With a financially literate population, it is expected that the country will see growth as more people will be financially secure.

The Social Enterprise Boost Initiative led to the inclusion of social enterprise consideration within the revised MSME and Entrepreneurship Policy. This will impact the way social enterprises do business and therefore how they are able to impact their beneficiaries. The incubator equipped social enterprises with resources to improve their productivity and profitability, and 21 social enterprises generated over **\$88 Million** in revenue, which was **50%** more than the amount generated in 2016.

Education continues to be the most valuable asset one can have in a developing country and it was iLead's mission to rescue underperforming schools in underdeveloped communities to help them achieve their fullest potential. Since iLead's inception in 2014 schools have praised the work done by the iLead team and have reported positive changes in their school's performance, management process and the future outlook of their school. This year, **6,625** students and **360 teachers** benefitted from iLead's intervention.



At JN Foundation, we are extremely proud to report that **133 students** were awarded scholarships during the year. As we continue to promote our heritage, The Parish Histories team completed the documentation of **three parishes**, **captured 1,500 historical images**, and **engaged with just under 6,000 people**, one of whom was the late **Violet Moss-Brown**, previously, the world's oldest person.

The Road Safety Hub was successfully **launched in November** with the Prime Minister of Jamaica, Hon. Andrew Holness, being present for this ground breaking initiative as well as other key stakeholders. Research is underway for a new project with UNICEF which seeks to make crosswalks close to schools safer. Over, **41,000 primary school students** were trained to be better road users through the Police in Schools Project. Police in Schools delivered over 200 lectures at 147 primary-level schools islandwide which is approximately 18% of primary schools in Jamaica.

2017's Labour Day theme was "Restore, Preserve, Beautify". Over **60 JN Group volunteers** participated in one of the major projects in the island, the refurbishing of Central Police Station in Downtown, Kingston. Twenty other JN Foundation funded projects were happening simultaneously with close to **400 volunteers** distributed across the island.

We are indeed very happy to have been able to deliver yet another successful year of innovating, inspiring and impacting Jamaicans and Jamaican communities.





The Source ... communities transforming communities

The call for social intervention programmes to stem crime and violence and to reduce poverty in our inner-city communities has become deafening and is viewed by many as the "saviour" that can help to lasso the runaway crime rate.

However, some doubters argue that social interventions are oft times unsustainable and, therefore, make no difference, hence, they are simply a waste of resources.

But, there is one social intervention model, which during the past decade has emerged and proven to be the exception. The JN Foundation was the first to utilize the Social Enterprise Model to establish five Source Centres across Jamaica, which are still operative and making a difference.

The Source was developed in 2007 as an intervention in underserved communities to provide lifestyle changing services through the use of existing community space to create a hub for activities, to influence growth and employment.

The JN Foundation wanted to achieve long term provision, and so pursued the social enterprise model, which is basically a business that operates to fulfill a social mission. The Source in August Town was established in 2007 and was the first social enterprise in Jamaica.

The social enterprise model always takes into account three things: people, planet and profit. One cannot achieve sustainable development of community or country if Pary 980 yetath AN REVALVE 20165 ing.

The Source in August Town celebrated its 10th anniversary in March of 2017.

Following the success of The Source, August Town, four other Centres, were established in: Maverley, St. Andrew; Ocho Rios, St. Ann; Treasure Beach, St Elizabeth; and the Savanna-la-Mar Source, in Westmoreland.

As such, the Source in August Town focused on several key priorities.

1. Development of efficient core business services which would generate revenue for the Centre, which included: a documentation centre, media library, meeting room and more.



2. Partnerships with community groups, to encourage the buy-in of community members and ownership of the Centres.



3. Establishment of the centre as a place of refuge. The environment was relaxing and aesthetically appealing, with management which generated personality, love and joy.





The last centre that was established is in Savanna-La-Mar, Westmoreland, in 2012, and was driven by women who had an average age of 76 and were part of the Y's Menettes Service Club.

These ladies are true community champions, who have been serving the community needs of Russia, Grotto and Barracks Road for more than 50 years.

The Source Centres continue to be at the heart of the communities in which they operate. These Source Centres are valid representations of the "People First," commitment of The Jamaica National Group to support and grow communities. These Centres are part of the social enterprise legacy that JN continues to create daily.



The Parish Histories of Jamaica project was developed by the JN Foundation, in partnership with the Department of History and Archaeology (DoHA) at the University of the West Indies (UWI). The generation of the project stemmed from a need to use history as a uniting force amongst Jamaicans. This project captures and documents the unique histories of all fourteen (14) parishes in Jamaica and makes it available through a platform that is easily accessible to all; a website historyjamaica.org

So far, the project has completed five parishes: Westmoreland, St. Thomas. Trelawny, St. Mary and Portland. The next five parishes to be completed are; St. Catherine, St. James, Manchester, St.Elizabeth and Kingston & St. Andrew.



Mr. Issacs was born in Preston Hill in St. Mary and has lived in the parish for 79 years. He opened up to the project about his experiences arowing up in St. Mary as a young man and how the way of life has changed over the years.







SUPPORTING INNOVATIVE STRATEGIES FOR EDUCATION



At JN Foundation, we believe that the ability of a nation to move forward is dependent on the capacity of our youth to drive development and growth. Through the improvement of the educational achievement of our students; we empower young people who are motivated, inspired and display leadership qualities that can create a better future for all Jamaicans, whilst equipping teachers and school leaders to transform the outcomes of all students.

Key Projects

1. iLead, for three years, worked on creating leaders who cultivate and demand the educational advancement of teachers and students.

2. Science Genius empowers students and teachers to get excited about Science using the Dancehall rhythm (riddim)

3. Scholarships - started by the JN Group in 1983, over 535 student scholarships have been awarded. The JN Scholarship programme breaks financial barriers so students can achieve their educational goals at both the secondary and tertiary level.



DELIVERING SOLUTIONS FOR IMPROVED SAFETY OF OUR CITIZENS

Across Jamaica, the safety and security of our citizens continues to be of great concern to all of us. A key outcome of the JN Foundation is to enhance the health and safety of all Jamaicans, and we do this by focusing on data led interventions tackling proper road user behaviour and road safety.

Key Projects

1. Road Safety Hub in partnership with the Jamaica Constabulary Force, Traffic and Highway Division, the Fédération Internationale de l'Automobile (FIA), JN General Insurance and Jamaica Automobile Association. Construction of a state of the art Hub equipped with real time road user data provided by Mona Geoinformatics, along with training equipment used to develop and implement strategic plans to improve road safety in Jamaica.

2. X Marks the Spot in partnership with United Nations Children's Fund(UNICEF) which is implementing solutions for creating safer road spaces for pedestrians and motorists through research and improved road infrastructure.

3. The Cost of Care Report in partnership with the University of the West Indies Hospital, the Violence Prevention Alliance and the Mona Geoinformatics, was the culmination of a three-year research project which collected data from seven major hospitals across the island to determine the cost of care for people admitted to medical institutions for treatment of violence related injuries and road crash related injuries. The data from this research is being used by health and security agencies to develop and deliver interventions to address relevant concerns.
